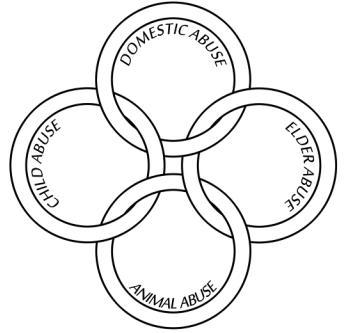


THE LINK BETWEEN ANIMAL CRUELTY AND HUMAN VIOLENCE

Domestic violence is often viewed as something that happens to other people yet, statistics show, it crosses all demographics including income and race. But what many people don't realize is that the abuse of animals is often concurrent with domestic violence, elder abuse and the abuse of children. It is common for abusers to coerce or show dominance over individuals in a household by hurting or killing family pets. However, while animal abuse is a key indicator of domestic violence, it often goes unreported.



REPORT ABUSE

If you see any form of domestic violence, animal abuse, child abuse, or elder abuse report it immediately to a local law enforcement agency, child protective service, or animal control agency.
